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

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Medal of Honor: 5 Surprising Facts About the Military's Highest Award

Behind the United States' highest military award are people willing to give the ultimate sacrifice. We remember their bravery on March 25. National Medal of Honor Day.


1. A Civil War drummer boy is the youngest recipient.

During the Civil War, 11-year-old William Johnston enlisted in the Union Army, In 1862 — the same year a bill established the Medal of Honor -- Confederate forces overpowered Johnston's unit, forcing the men to retreat and discard their equipment. But Johnston refused to relinquish his drum. When President Abraham Lincoln heard, he wrote the secretary of war to nominate Johnston.



2. More than 20% of recipients are immigrants.

According to the CATO Institute, foreign-born U.S. soldiers have been honored for their bravery on the battlefield in every war since the medal's inception. The first Mexican to be recognized, Staff Sgt. Marcario Garcia single-handedly silenced two German machine gun emplacements — despite being wounded allowing his company to advance.



3. Only one woman has received the honor.

A civilian contractor, Mary Edwards Walker was the first female surgeon employed by the Army. The only woman and one of just eight civilians to receive the medal, Walker earned the award for treating patients across enemy lines, which led to her capture by Confederate forces. In 1917, a military board rescinded the medals of nearly 1,000 recipients who had not engaged in "actual combat with the enemy." President Jimmy Carter restored her award in 1977



4. Theodore Roosevelt is the only presidential recipient.

President Bill Clinton awarded the medal to the Rough Riders leader 82 years after his death. Roosevelt was previously overlooked because of a lack of evidence during the Spanish-American War. Bonus: Buffalo Bill and Charles Lindbergh are two other famous recipients.



Formal benefits include a monthly pension, increased retirement pay, free flights on military aircraft, invitations to presidential inaugurations and a gold-lettered headstone if buried at Arlington National Ceremony. USAA employee Grace Adams Fawcett, daughter of medal recipient Staff Sgt. Lucian Adams, remembers accompanying her dad to Richard Nixon's second presidential inauguration. 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
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
